Finding peace of mind, close to home

nce a month, Carol Roehrich drives the short distance from her home in New Leipzig, comfortably settles into one of the treatment rooms at Jacobson Memorial Hospital Care Center (JMHCC) in Elgin, and receives an IV infusion.

The three- to four-hour process is completed locally following JMHCC's expansion of its services to include any type of infusion other than chemotherapy treatments.

And Carol appreciates having the service available locally.

"They wanted to do them in Bismarck. ... I thought no way am I sitting in Bismarck when I could have it done here." Carol said.

"I've had lung problems pretty much all my life," Carol explained. Those issues began flaring following the death of her husband, Jerry, in 2016, leading Carol to hospitalizations several times. Dr. Alan Lindemann, one of two doctors at JMHCC, referred Carol to specialists, including a heart and lung specialist, an ear, nose and throat specialist, and an allergy specialist, to try to pinpoint Carol's health threats.

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CAROL ROEHRICH: from page 1 marck, she still kept her care as local as possible, getting a CT locally at JMHCC prior to her Bismarck appointment with the ear, nose and throat specialist.

"I said I'm going to have it done in Elgin. We got a brand new CT scanner. Why would I have it done in Bismarck?" she said.

It was her visit with the allergy specialist that led her to an answer.

"That's when we discovered that my immune system was so low," she said. To boost her system, she started IV infusions two years ago at JMHCC. The infusions boost her immunoglobulin deficiencies, which were about half of normal levels when she started.

"I found out I could have it done here and they've been really good about it," Carol said.

"The first year I did the infusions, I had great success. I didn't have any flareups, no hospital stays, everything was good," she said. Carol did experience a setback early last year, but an increase in the solution in September solved those problems, too.

"I've been doing OK since then," she said.

The treatments were possible at JMHCC following staff training and education on the medication, explained JMHCC CEO Theo Stoller. The infusion services have since been expanded to include most types of infusions on an outpatient basis.

And Carol saw the staff go above and beyond when a shortage of her IV solution occurred. JMHCC staff drove to Bismarck to obtain more so she could continue the treatments locally.

"That's just a part of how we operate," Stoller said. "We do whatever we can possibly do to help our patients."

"I'm so thankful for this hospital here," Carol said. "I was so happy I didn't have to do this in Bismarck. I don't enjoy driving in Bismarck. I will if I have to, but I don't like to."

Carol tries to use JMHCC for any treatment she needs, including her mammogram appointments, the CT she needed and an MRI she required before needing back surgery earlier. Carol's mother, Betty Weller, was also a long-term care resident at JMHCC

for nine years.

"She always considered that her home," Carol said.

"I do everything here," she simply said. "Anything that I have to have done, if we can do it here, I have it done here."

Carol and her late husband, Jerry, have been strong supporters of JMHCC in other ways. Jerry served on the Jacobson Memorial Hospital Foundation board and the two are regular donors.

"We were always big promoters of the hospital, just to keep it local," she said.

Carol supports the local facility because it has offered her and her family peace of mind, close to home.

"It's always been home to me," she said. "I've always thought the care was really good over there. It's more personable. You know the people and I know a lot of the staff."



Branded boards now adorn walls





JMHCC relaunches cardiac rehab program

acobson Memorial Hospital Care Center (JMHCC) has reinstated its cardiac rehabilitation program, allowing patients to use exercise equipment at the facility under the watchful eye of trained staff to recover following a heart attack or heart surgery.

Under the cardiac rehabilitation program, patients are closely monitored while they exercise. The program and exercises are undertaken when either Dr. Alan Lindemann or Dr. Elizabeth Sundberg are at the facility. The program also incorporates education on diet and lifestyle choices following heart surgery.

To join the program, patients need a doctor's referral. After a six- to eight-week recovery following surgery, patients then begin the rehab program, taking small steps toward full recovery over 36 visits.

What is cardiac rehab?

The cardiac rehabilitation program takes place at JMHCC in Elgin to help patients recover following heart surgery or a heart attack. Talk to your provider about how to enter the rehab program. Rehab helps patients recover under the watchful eye of trained staff.

Who needs cardiac rehab?

You may benefit from rehab if you have had:

- · A heart attack
- A heart procedure or surgery

What happens at rehab?

First, you'll have a medical evaluation to establish your needs and limitations.

Then you'll follow a customized exercise program at JMHCC under the close supervision of medical staff who will continually monitor you during the exercise.

You will start slowly, following a safe physical activity program that gradually allows you to meet your goals and become stronger.

- · You'll exercise using a treadmill, steps and a NuStep.
- You'll be screened for depression, which can be the result of dramatic lifestyle changes following a heart attack.
- You'll be weighed at each session and learn more about healthy diet and lifestyle choices.

What are the benefits?

- With the rehab close to home, you won't have to travel when you are still recovering.
 - You'll feel secure and less fearful about exercising.
- Medicare and other insurance cover a certain number of sessions.

a nurse, she worked at a clinic and nursing home in Dickinson, as well as the Richardton Health Center.

"That's what led me here," she said, also pointing to her familiar-

ity with Rhonda Schmidt, FNP-C, who works for JMHCC at the Glen Ullin Family Medical Clinic. "I thought if they can hire good people like that, it must be a good place to work."

April was drawn to a career in the medical field after helping to care for her brother, who is five years younger than her.

"I think what probably led me to it is that my brother was diabetic since he was 2 and so that caretaking role kind of started early for me," she said. "I learned a lot of empathy and compassion, so I figured that was my calling."

Her decision to pursue her career as an FNP was based on her hope to help patients with more preventative care. she said.

"I wanted to be someone who could intervene on the preventative care side, stopping things before they start and encourage people to lead healthier lives," she said.

She enjoys the medical field, due to its variety and the often fast pace in the emergency room, where she hopes to gain more experience.

"It's something different every day," she said. "I like the emergency care. I think that's why I played basketball. I'm kind of an adrenaline junkie and I have a pretty calm demeanor as well."

"When I came down here to work, I like the small town feel of it," she said of JMHCC. "That's the rural aspect of it. You get to do everything."

As a provider, April describes herself as an "old soul," who was called "grandma" by her teammates because she would crochet during bus rides to basketball games.

She translates that aspect of her personality into an interest in her patient's life stories.

"Their stories really interest me, because that's a part of history that's dying. I've gotten to meet some pretty interesting people with stories about Germany and the war and other things," she said.

"In our downtime, that's what we do," April said with a laugh.

Plan ahead for medication refills

t has happened. You open your medication bottle and notice you only have one or two pills left. But that's a scenario everyone would like to avoid, including your local clinic and pharmacy.

Jacobson Memorial Hospital Care Center (JMHCC) and its clinics in Elgin, Glen Ullin and Richardton remind patients to pay close attention to the number of remaining pills and the availability of refills on the prescription.

If your prescription or medication bottle states that refills are still available, simply call your local pharmacy for a refill. Calling the pharmacy directly avoids confusion with the clinic, as the clinic is not the proper outlet to refill a prescription.

So remember:

Refills still available on label?

Call pharmacy

If your prescription label states that no refills are available, you will need to make an appointment at least two weeks before your medication is gone. JMHCC asks patients to pay close attention to the number of remaining pills, then call well ahead of time for a clinic appointment to obtain a refill.

Once the appointment is completed, a refill can typically be filled by the local pharmacy that day. However, providers are not always readily available, so appointments cannot always be made the same day.

"The clinics need some lead time to accommodate patients who need to see a provider to obtain a refill," explained JMHCC Director of Nursing TyAwna Ackerman.

So remember:

No refills available on label?

· Get doctor appointment two weeks in advance if need

Another scenario for prescription refills is when only a yearly visit is required. Providers often will write a prescription for six months. When that prescription is completed and the patient does not have to see the provider for another six months, the clinic can be contacted and the provider can write another prescription. However, the clinic needs at least 48 hours to respond to those requests also, again due to provider availability.

"The message we want to share with patients is to leave plenty of time to fill or refill your prescriptions," Ackerman said. ■
