of \$1,000 or more to the CT scanner project will be recognized on a plaque in the new CT room.

This year, all funds donated through Giving Hearts Day will be dedicated to the renovation project to incorporate a new CT scanner inside the facility. The hospital currently leases an eight-slice CT scanner that is housed in a mobile unit located outside. Patients must go outside to enter the CT scanner mobile unit.

Recently, JMHCC received a grant to access the latest CT diagnostic technology from The Leona M. and Harry B. Helmsley Charitable Trust's Rural Healthcare Program. The Trust awarded JMHCC \$380,387 to purchase a new 32-slice CT scanner.

CT scanners provide essential diagnostic images of the body. A new CT

scanner will allow for faster scans that produce high-quality images, allowing medical staff to quickly determine the health status and course of treatment right here at home.

The new scanner will be owned by the hospital, which will also reduce its lease expenses.

Now, the hospital is planning a renovation project to house the new CT scanner inside the facility. The renovation will be completed in rooms in the lower level of the hospital that were once used for sterilization procedures and which are no longer being utilized.

JMHCC will carry the full expense of this renovation project, and needs your help to offset as much of the cost as possible.

The JMHF is a nonprofit organization formed in 2006 to raise funds to

help financially support JMHCC.

Funds raised by the JMHF are designated by a board for specific projects or expenditures to support JMHCC. The JMHF board makes those decisions based upon current needs of the hospital. Donations are a vital component of overall funding support of the hospital.

The JMHF board includes Jeff Hillius, secretary/treasurer, Elgin, district manager for Montana-Dakota Utilities; Rep. James Schmidt, Mandan, who represents District 31 in the N.D. House of Representatives; Robert Larson, a retiree from Elgin; Marcy Haase, an RN at JMHCC who represents JMHCC on the foundation board; and Linda Koepplin, the social services designee and activities director at JMHCC.

Giving Hearts Day is coordinated by the Dakota Medical Foundation, the Impact Foundation and the Alex Stern Family Foundation.

Physician assistant joins medical staff

Arthur Renner is the newest midlevel provider at Jacobson Memorial Hospital Care Center (JMHCC) and its affiliated clinics in Elgin and Glen Ullin. A certified physician assistant, he will begin seeing patients in February after shadowing Dr. Deepak Goyal at the clinics and hospital for a time.

A lifetime resident of Bismarck, Renner received a bachelor of science degree in radiology from the University of Mary. His background includes working in radiology at the Regional MRI Center and also at CHI St. Alexius Health in Bismarck.

Renner completed X-rays, CT scans, MRI tests and worked in a heart catheterization lab, completing interventional radiology and also working as a scrub technician in the lab. His most recent position was completing tests on a traveling MRI mobile unit.

"I decided I've done everything there is in X-ray there is to do. I see patients come in and I help find the diagnosis, but I don't know what hap-

pens to them afterwards," he said.

His interest in continuing to care for his patients led him to physician assistant training through the University of North Dakota, where he completed a master's degree.

His wife, Sabrina, also has a bachelor of science degree in radiology and is also a Bismarck native. Renner has a stepson, Gabriel, 11, and three grown children. His fifth grandchild is due soon.

"To me, family is very important," he said.

The family has visited the community, and they are still making decisions about living in Elgin or commuting.

Renner grew up visiting a relative's farm in the Elgin area in the summers, so he is familiar with the area.

"Every summer when I was growing up, I stayed at a farm all summer," he said.

"My wife was very impressed with the school system," he added.

Renner started his medical career when a friend who was a nurse advised him to study radiology.

"I've loved it ever since. I've always wanted to help people. I like to help people and take care of people," he said. Renner particularly enjoys pediatric care and hopes to include children among his patients.

Outside of his career, Renner enjoys fishing and hunting, along with traveling. He also describes himself as "a big Harry Potter fan." ■

Patient room tablets share health information

The patient exam rooms at the Elgin Community Clinic are now even more informative, with the installation of touch-screen tablets in each room.

During their wait, patients can watch health-related videos of their choice. Program segments include personal stories and lifestyle segments, along with nutrition, diet and exercise tips.

"These touch-screen tablets, which are mounted on pedestals, are a great way to keep patients entertained while they wait, along with sharing additional health information," says Jacobson Memorial Hospital Care Center CEO Theo Stoller.

Patients can use the touch screen to choose topics related to heart

health, diabetes health, men's health or women's health. Patients can learn about the issues most important to them, including how to implement a healthier lifestyle with a chronic condition, by watching in-depth features on specific conditions.

Patients can forward recipes, tips or videos to their home email address or sign up for the patient portal.

Programming is updated once a month, so new information is always available. The tablets automatically turn on and off based on the clinic's hours. The clinic will also be able to use the tablets to share local information with patients.


The clinic's waiting room also has a new TV and programming directed toward health issues, along with the latest news and weather.

Two nurses dedicated to JMHCC recognized

Debra Gaugler and Viola Sprenger were both given treasured gifts from their mothers that led them to nursing.

"I've always wanted to be a nurse. I had no other wishes," Viola says.

"My mother made me a nurse outfit with a hat," Viola describes. Then, Viola would get up at night with a flashlight in hand, pretending to check on patients.

Debbie's path to nursing also started with her mother.

"My mother was going to be a nurse. She did start out and it didn't work out for her and I thought, 'Well I can do this.' She gave me her bandage scissors and her name was engraved on it. I still have it," she says.

JMHCC's longtime employees were recognized for their service during JMHCC's 2015 annual meeting. Debra Gaugler and Viola Sprenger were recognized for 40 years of service to JMHCC. Linette Raab was recognized for 20 years of service.

Both Viola and Debbie started working at JMHCC in 1975, along with the late Bonnie Hauck. Marcy Haase has been at JMHCC the longest, with 44 years.

The two LPNs remember working at the former Lorenzen Memorial Hospital in Elgin, before JMHCC was constructed in 1977.

During tours of the new facility, Debbie remembers being awestruck by its size.

"It was a big wow when we opened, because it was so big at that time," she says. "Now, we've been here so long, we know every nook and cranny."

Viola started her career as a CNA in Garrison, then spent time at hospitals in Dickinson, Jamestown and Bismarck before getting married and moving to Elgin.

"I've always been here," Debbie describes. She graduated from high school in Elgin, attended college in Dickinson, then married and returned to Elgin.

But both have similar passions for their careers.

"I like to help the patients," Viola says. "To help people. It's a little different now than when we started. Now, it's more paperwork."

"I like caring for people," Debbie echoes "It's good to know the people who live here."

The advent of the computer was

probably the biggest change in their careers, they both agree.

"When the computer kicked in, not that you can't learn new things, but we weren't brought up on that, so it was a challenge," Debbie says. "But I would never go back to paper. That was a lot of laborious hours."

As the two cross paths during the change in shifts in the evening, Debbie starts the nightly pot of coffee and the two reminisce for a moment.

Debbie has been working the night shift at JMHCC for 35 years.

"We have spent more time up here than we have with our own families," she says. She points out that now they recognize a new generation of patients.

"We took care of their parents," Debbie says. "It's almost coming full circle already."

While neither was on duty, they both vividly remember the 1978 tornado that struck Elgin, damaging a portion of JMHCC, leaving glass and fluttering curtains in its wake. They share a story of one nurse getting cuts as she covered a patient who couldn't be moved.

"That's dedication," Viola says.

But that's the type of dedication shared by the entire staff even today.

Even as longtime nurses, both continually update their training to provide the best care possible for their patients. And they share their dedication with others.

"We have always had some very, very good providers," Viola says.
"They are genuine and they care." ■

20-year employee also recognized

Linette Raab, who has been recognized for 20 years of service, started working at JMHCC as a certified nursing assistant in 1995. Always interested in learning new things, she assisted in the physical therapy department and then worked as the unit secretary at the nurse's station before moving into the business office to work with accounts payable and central supply.

In 2014, she decided to pursue an online degree in medical coding, moving into the medical records department. Now, she works with medical coding, also helping with release of information, appeals and ordering office supplies for the facility "and whatever

else comes my way," she says.

"I've always liked health care. I've found it to be interesting, because it's always changing and I like change," she says. "I like having a variety of things to do."

"With all the different departments I've worked in, I've seen how one job affects another job," she says. "I've gotten to see the whole picture of how everything comes together."

Linette relishes the challenges and diversity of medical coding.

"It's always challenging," she says. And she enjoys the hospital setting.

"Working here, you get to know everybody and it has that hometown feel. You're actually a person, you're
